

FROM OUR BUSINESS MANAGER

Greetings Brothers & Sisters

his fall, 332 was really back in the swing of things with our union activities. It's nice to see the members turn out and participate. It strengthens the brother- and sisterhood of the union.

The November mid-term election was a big success for labor, not only on the national stage, but in California and locally, where our elected leaders really have a lot of sway around our members' work. **Out of 80 candidates and ballot measures that Local 332 endorsed, 78 won.** Thank you to our members for precinct walking, phone banking, and most importantly, voting.

Another big thing that happened this fall was that we ratified the Sound & Communication contract. We won the biggest wage increase in our history with a raise of \$4.50, demonstrating how the contractors see the value of our members' skill and work. The contract is for one year, and the allocation vote result was as follows:

\$3.25 for wages, \$.85 went to pension, \$.40 for health and welfare, and starting January 1st, there will be a dues checkoff for the unit.

I encourage members to spread the word about the S&C NorCal apprenticeship. We are seeing double-digit growth in that industry, and there's a real opportunity for young applicants. Our commercial apprenticeship gets 3000 applicants a year with a waiting list of 600. The S&C only has a fraction of that, so the odds are good for people to get in. 
Looking ahead to 2023, we are focusing a lot on the residential market. Because of legislation passed by President Biden as well as Governor Newsom, there are federal and state dollars coming down the pike to build affordable housing. We need to ensure that PLAs are in place and that work goes to our members.

EVCS Training Available

With the passage of President Biden's historic infrastructure bill, \$40 billion is coming to California over the next ten years, in part for electric vehicle charging stations. There is also \$20 million being devoted to Santa Clara County VTA's new electric bus fleet and charging stations. I highly encourage members take advantage of our Training Center's electric vehicle charging stations classes coming soon in 2023.

Right now there is a lot of work on our commercial side, but with a potential recession coming, things could change. Having these valuable skills will help secure your work for the next decade in this new industry. Look for information in 2023 at ETASV.org.

2022 MIDTERM ELECTION ROUNDUP

332 Members Helped Move 78 Out of 80 Candidates/Measures to Victory!

Victory for Our Two Most Critical Candidates!

With 37 new legislators in Sacramento, it was important to elect folks who have our backs. Aisha Wahab's CA Senate race was essential to all of the IBEW's statewide work. She has been a champion for IBEW and the building trades for years, and we were thrilled to help her get across the finish line. Sylvia Arenas' opponent for the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors race was one of the most anti-union legislators in the county, and with her win, we can safeguard and push for more PLAs.

We Kept Our Pro-Union Majority in San Jose!

With the passage of Measure B in the June election to move the mayoral race to presidential election years and Rosemary Kamei's victory for the City Council District 1 seat, we maintained our pro-labor majority on council and put ourselves in a solid position for 2024. We had two disappointing losses for our staunch allies: Cindy Chavez for mayor and Maya Esparza for city council; but we will continue to move forward. We feel confident that in 2024, with the stronger voter turnout resulting from Measure B, we will have our first pro-union mayor in 25 years. Additionally, our council majority delivered on an appointment process for the two open seats: Districts 8 and 10. We will likely strengthen our majority with a pro-union appointment.

Victories Across the Region to Keep Our Members Working!

In Mountain View, we kept our pro-union supermajority, and in Palo Alto, we picked up a majority of pro-union councilmembers. With so much 332 work in these two cities, we know we can count on both city councils to ensure that new projects go union. We also got some great, job-creating measures passed at the Alum Rock and East Side Union school Districts which should keep our members working for a long time thanks to our strong PLAs.

Big-Time Reminder: Every Vote Counts!



WESTERN STATES ELECTRICAL CONTEST

Michael Brotherton | Turned Out in June 2022 & Now at Blue Arc Electric

"Before I was in the trades, I was a part-time mechanic, worked at a grocery store, and was going to school for mechanical engineering. I was looking at pay rates and saw that electricians made the same amount or more than engineers who needed more schooling. I talked to my grandfather, who was a 40-year electrician, and it just made more sense for me to go into the trades.

"The apprenticeship was awesome. You get what you put into it. You'll learn a lot no matter what, but there's a lot more available than just the basic curriculum. You can take extra classes, take advantage of tutoring, and tap into resources you just won't get anywhere else.

"A few months ago, I got a call from Robert Chon at the training center asking me if I'd like to come in and train for the Western States Electrical Contest. There were two other people, but I was the only one available to go.

"The competition was fierce, and clearly the other contestants had really put in months of training. Their practice showed because the events were all about speed, and they were faster than me. The pipe bending was the most fun: you had to be exact, take every measurement, and it got me back into doing things correctly. Though I didn't win anything, I had a great time, did my best work, and I was proud to represent Local 332.


"I think the best part about being an electrician is being able to wire my house and not have to call anyone. There's a lot of opportunity and freedom in the trades. In my spare time, I like to build race cars. It's challenging doing all the engineering and troubleshooting to make your car do what you want. Whether it's cars or electrical work, I like being able to step back and be proud of what I've built. It's really the best the feeling."

332 BENEFIT FOR OPERATION FREEDOM PAWS



"In the military, teamwork and hard work are paramount, and there was always a new problem to solve.

Everybody has a job to do and an important role to play on the team. We always approached problems with an attitude of 'adapt and overcome.' You figure it out and do what is necessary to get the job done.

"That same ethic carries through to the union and construction work. It's very similar at job sites where we just have to figure things out, work through problems, and keep at it until we get the job done.

"With our IBEW brothers and sisters, and with veterans in general, there's a camaraderie and a sense of family. I was missing that feeling when I left the service, but found it again in the brotherhood of the IBEW.

"There are so many veterans who need help, which is why 332 is proud to support Operation Freedom Paws." Local 332 has many members who have served in the armed forces, and the union supports veterans wherever we can. One example has been our partnership with Operation Freedom Paws (OFP). The nonprofit trains and places service dogs for veterans. The cost for each trained dog is upwards of \$20,000, but it is free for the vets. These service dogs are life-changing for many veterans in our community.

This November, we held a poker tournament to benefit OFP. We had a great turnout and raised over \$2,300. The nonprofit has also been the recipient of 332's golf tournament donations, and we've volunteered many hours installing new lighting and electric heaters at their facility. The union is proud to support such a phenomenal organization.

Christopher Paup | Inside Wireman | 332 Sargent in Arms | CA Air National Guard Technical Sargent



"I joined the CA Air National Guard in the 129th Search and Rescue Wing out of Moffett Field in 2011. I've been on active duty ever since as an aircraft mechanic. I love our deployed mission and just recently returned from a five-month deployment in the Middle East. But I also love our stateside mission which includes wildland firefighting. We take our helicopters up, scoop baskets of water, and dump thousands of gallons at a time on fires.

"We've been very busy over the last few years. A few times I was on the job doing electrical work, and I

had to go to my foreman to say, 'We just got activated by the governor and have to get our planes in the air. I'd go home, shave, pack, and then be out in the field.

"There's actually a lot of similarities between the military and the union. I tell people that the IBEW is the most military-like civilian organization I know of in regards to how we as union members have each other's backs. The similarities go all the way down to the training, where the older, more experienced journeymen take on apprentices. On the military side, I train my airmen much the same way.

"The transition between both organizations is pretty smooth because of the structure, support, and camaraderie. There's a deep bond among union electricians the same way there is in the military because of our shared interests and values. It's an inherent part of both jobs to take care of each other and lift each other up, making both organizations very effective."

"It took six months with lots of hands-on work, using different aspects of lighting. We applied our skills in a real-life scenario. It was great to see some of the apprentices learn new things. And it was amazing for everyone involved to be so creative and see our vision become a reality after working on the weekends and after work.

"About 500 members, families, friends, and community turned out for the event. We opened our doors to show what the IBEW is all about. We showcased what we can do with lighting, and that we're so much more than an on/off switch. The sky is the limit, and we built everything ourselves on a



budget. What's more is that we provided a positive, safe environment for everyone to have fun. Family and friends are so important, and it was great to gather after not seeing people in the pandemic."
