


#### **In-Person Union Meetings Continue**



#### **Local 332 President Javier Casillas**

In the last economic downturn, 332 had over 350 travelers working while local brothers and sisters were out of work. Many had to leave our jurisdiction to provide for their families. We are now in another potential downturn and are currently running with 750-800 travelers. Did you know that only 332 members fund our pension, while travelers' money goes back to their home locals?





- ♦ Keep your skills sharp and take some upgrade courses.
- ♦ Keep your state cert. current with the renewal date in your calendar.
- ♦ Attend every union meeting (bimonthly or quarterly works too).
- Read the 332 and I/O newsletters, emails from the hall, and all pension/ health & welfare communications.
- ♦ Call the hall for all CBA questions and interpretations.
- ♦ Look out for each other on the job site and in our communities.

You might be thinking, "I just want to go to work." Here is the deal: "We need to man our 332 work with 332 hands!" Our conditions are what we make of them. It's understandable that you may not want to go to certain contractors, but if we don't man as much work as possible, there will be an accumulation of travelers, depriving our pension fund. As 332 journeymen, we need to keep each other working in busy and slow times. Our retirees depend on our pension contributions, just like you will depend on the next generation when you retire. As IBEW Local 332 brothers and sisters, we are responsible for one another and our collective future.

know folks are concerned that work started off slow this year. We've been here before, as construction always has its ups and downs, but we've had a 15-year run. There are some younger members who have never been through a downturn before. It's important to always remember: it's temporary! Just ask any older member.

Behind the scenes, we have been planning for this moment for years, knowing there will always be short-lived slowdowns. **The union is hustling on your behalf to secure work for the members:** 

- Bo Town Project: This is a mixed-use residential/commercial
  development projected to come online in October. It will have 150K
  man-hours for our inside wiremen, residential, S&C, and material
  handlers. 332 is negotiating with our contractror, Redwood Electric
  Group, to meet the developer's budget and schedule and secure five
  years of work for our members.
- MEPS (mechanical, electrical, plumbing, and sprinklerfitters):
   Our skilled trade organization with partner unions has been working to improve our relationship to developers, finding ways to partner.
   MEPS has incredible value with developers because of our ability to supply a workforce with cutting-edge skills to development projects.
- Strengthening relationships with elected leaders: Because of our Local's ongoing political work, we have been able to secure more PLAs than ever before in our history. We've also passed policies that put union contractors at a competitive advantage for all public projects because of our apprenticeship and world-class journeymen.

As a member of Local 332, you have the full power of the union fighting to secure work for you and your IBEW brothers and sisters!

### TRAINING CENTER OPEN HOUSE FOR WOMEN

"I had the pleasure of speaking at the women's event at the ETA-SV to share my three-year journey. I wanted to show other women that if I could do it, so could they.

"Before entering the trades, I struggled as an unemployed single mother. Regardless of circumstances, I was determined to push myself, stay strong, and never give up. I was the only woman in my class with 79 men. Fear and intimidation were just two of the many emotions I endured.

"Although the trade is predominantly men, they make every effort to ensure that you feel accepted in the IBEW.

"The job itself is challenging, but it is similar to a gym workout. You have to be physically and mentally strong. In the beginning, it might be hard, but don't give up. Nothing is out of reach if you believe in yourself and your abilities. And that's what I told the women at the event: You are smart, you are beautiful, and you are strong."

#### Leiloni Malone-Garza | S&C Journeyman

"At the ETA-SV, we had an open house for women to expose them to the trades and hopefully apply for the apprenticeship. There were about 50 women who showed up. The atmosphere felt like a community of people coming together to show other women that though this is a male-dominated field, it's something they can do, and do well.

"There were commercial, S&C, and residential labs all run by 332 member volunteers like me. I like to help. The root is that I'd like to see more women in the workforce. Right now, I'm usually the only woman on the job site, and I stick out. I want to see more female workers in every trade--not just the IBEW--so that I can work alongside women carpenters, plumbers, laborers, etc.

"At the event, we definitely won a lot of people over: They were interested in learning more after having so much hands-on experience. I was shopping and ran into one of the women who attended. She was on the fence on whether to apply to the apprenticeship. But after seeing me, she got motivated like it was a sign.

"For me, I love learning, and the event inspired me to become an apprentice again and apply for the commercial program. I love that with the IBEW: There's always room to grow and learn more about the field."



### **WOMEN 332 MEMBERS MENTOR OTHER WOMEN**

#### Valerie Musbach | 23-Year Inside Wireman

"I got recruited into the trades through the CalWorks tradeswoman program at an event just like the one I volunteered at with the ETA-SV. The trades saved me, and I was able to start over a new life. I didn't thrive in college, but I was able to find a highly successful career that offers total financial freedom. I've taken time off several times to travel the world, have kids, and recover from surgery. Every time, I've had that yellow ticket to come back to work whenever I wanted. And I've always been able to pay the rent.

"I volunteered because I really love seeing women in the field. One time I'd probably gone 18 months without seeing a single female on the job. I ran up to her and threw my arms around her, which was definitely a bit much! I volunteered to reduce the stigma and recruit more women into the trades.

"The event was fantastic and a lot of fun. It's great to meet new people when you don't know what you're going to find. The most exciting part was training women and seeing the lights come on with people's insights and creativity.

"The majority of the time, the brotherhood has been really welcoming to women. Everyone really seems to enjoy doing their job with the diversity of cultures and genders, and that's what's so great about the IBEW!"

"I volunteered in the fire alarm labs for the women in the trades event. I don't like to put myself out there, as I'm usually nervous speaking in front of people. But the turnout was amazing, the people were awesome, and I got to meet a lot of top-notch tradeswomen.

"There's not enough women in the trades. People don't step out of their comfort zone, and it's scary to put yourself out there with a bunch of men. But we're strong, smart, and most of us excel in the trades.

"The event was successful because when you see someone like yourself that's in the field, it makes it attainable. We inspired a lot of women. They got their hands dirty, and I feel like I'll see a lot of their familiar faces on the job in the near future.

"All of the men I work with want me to be the best I can be. They really know their stuff and share their knowledge. That's part of being in the union family. If anyone has a problem, we all have each other's back."

"The union is like my second family. No one does you wrong. We're all part of this organization where everyone has each other's backs, and the better you work, the better it is for everybody. For me, my union brothers and sisters saved me after my accident.

"When I was a 5th year apprentice in 2017, I got into a car wreck. I was in a coma and had a severe brain injury. The doctors said I'd never walk again, but I was determined. A week after I woke up from my coma, I was able to get out of bed and walk with the help of my mom. I got pretty far by the time the nurse came in.

"I was out of work for a year while I recovered. The worst part was that I lost my memory. So I repeated my entire 5th year of the apprenticeship, and parts of my 2nd and 3rd until I started to

remember electrical theory. It was also hard to remember faces. Every time I'd see a classmate, I wouldn't know who they were, and it was hard talking to people. But because the union is such a family, everyone was patient with me and really encouraging. They all knew what I was going through and helped me come back to work.


"Part of my recovery has been photography. After being in the hospital for a month, I got a camera. Your mind forgets things, but when you see a picture, it all comes back. After my accident, pictures helped me remember, so I really started to love it. I loved capturing moments.

"I started to take pictures for Local 332. The union has been there for me, and I love giving back through photography. I'm so grateful to the brothers and sisters who have been there for me, and I love capturing the members at work and at union events. So if you see me with my camera, wave hello!"

#### August | Greg Moreno | 5th Year Apprentice

"Before I entered the apprenticeship, I was an intern with Rosendin in a project management program. I was working at the Apple campus, and I'd see these electricians on the job site who were really happy and loving what they are doing. I wished I had that. I spoke with a lot of people who encouraged me to get into the apprenticeship, so I applied.

"I really enjoy the program; it's more than I expected it to be. I thought electrical was just pipe, wires, outlets, and lights, but then I realized there was so much more to installing a building.




"I love working with the tools. I enjoy putting something up like a pipe rack or pipe run. You stand back and say, 'wow.' There's just this sense of permanance that gives you a feeling of accomplishment. For me, my biggest goal on the job is to finish tasks as efficiently as possible and always stay busy. Even if there's nothing to do, I'll look at prints or sweep the floor. Having that work ethic makes the day go faster and makes the work more enjoyable.

"For younger apprentices, my advice is to always stay hungry and look to the journeymen or foremen for the next task. That's what the brotherhood is about. Journeymen have taken me under their wing and treated me like a like a family member. And that's what I hope to do for the next generation once I turn out."

#### September | Adam Carr | 5th Year Apprentice

"Before the apprenticeship, I was a pitcher for the Washington Nationals. I was getting older and had a shoulder injury, so I needed to transition to something else. In the off-season, I worked with my older brothers as a nonunion electrician. In baseball, I was part of a strong union, so I knew that being a part of the electrical union was they way to go. I also felt that the union was the best way to provide for my family.

"As an electrician, you are constantly having to think and come up with solutions on the fly, which reminds me of baseball. I also like the upward mobility that comes with being a union



electrician. The first is to turn out as a journeyman and learn as much as I can before passing on that knowledge to the younger generation. I'm looking forward to becoming a foreman or even a general foreman. I've been with Sprig Electric, and they've done a great job exposing me to different electrical task that have improved my skills. My plan is to stick with them after I turn out and see what the future holds.

"Overall, the apprenticeship has been unbelievable and beneficial to my future. So it's a big honor to be acknowledged. My advice to younger apprentices is to keep working hard, have a good work ethic, and come in willing to learn and better yourself. All these things help you develop yourself to be a solid electrician."

#### October | Ben Montoya | 5th Year

"I worked at the Nummi plant and was a union member there. When it closed down, I got re-educated as an electrician. The union really supports your rights, provides a livable wage, and creates equality in the workplace to curtail favoritism. We're here to help each other to produce high-quality products. It keeps us competitive to help retain us over the nonunion shops which are trying to take work from us.



"I like to build things with my hands and have that sense of accomplishment when you finish. I enjoy the troubleshooting and figuring things out. I come to work every day, keep a positive attitude, and do my best to build good quality products. When you see the end result, you can step back and say, 'I built that.' I'm blessed to do what I do, so it makes it easy to go to work every day."

#### **November | Ellie Hunt | 5th Year (2-Time Winner)**

"I just try to show up every day and do my best. I ask a lot of questions, I'm willing to learn, and I always staying teachable. That's my approach to the apprenticeship, and I carry that throughout my life. I'm confident in my work, but not cocky. The number one thing I tell younger apprentices just coming into the trades is to show up every day and do your best. It might sound like a cliché, but if you do that as much as you can, you get results.



"I'm turning out in June, and I like being well versed in as much as I can. I love almost all the work, and feeder cables and big conduits are my favorite. I am working for Rosendin on the Google Caribbean campus. I'm really enjoying them as a company and feel taken care of. They provide everything that's needed, and the journeymen are really knowledgeable. I'm going to stick with them because they are such a well-rounded shop."

### December | Lilliana Martinez | 5th Year (3-Time Winner)

"I have a hunger to learn, and I try to ask questions at the job site, in class, and after class. If I'm stumped, I will search online or in the code book, and I won't stop until I have the answer. If I'm presented with a task, I'm going to find a solution, and that's that.

"I'm turning out in June, and it will be a bittersweet moment. I hope
I know enough to share my knowledge. My advice to younger
apprentices coming up is to A) Enjoy it! B) Really carve out time to look

### **BACK IT UP TO SEPT. 2022 CARS & COFFEE**





Dear Local 332 Member,

Nominations for Local Union 332 Officers as provided in the International Constitution and the Local Union Bylaws will take place orally during the General Membership Meeting, which convenes at 5:30 p.m. on Tuesday, May 2, 2023, at 2125 Canoas Garden Ave. Ste. 100 San Jose, CA 95125.

Nominations for the following Local Union Officers will be in order:

- \* President
- \* Vice President
- \* Recording Secretary
- \* Business Manager/Financial Secretary
- \* Treasurer
- \* Five (5) Executive Board Members
- \* Five (5) Examining Board Members

In accordance with Article 16, Section 10, of the IBEW Constitution, "No member shall be nominated for office unless he is present or signifies his willingness in writing, nor shall he be eligible for any office unless he has been a member in continuous good standing at least two (2) years in the L.U. immediately prior to nomination, providing the L.U. has been in existence for this length of time. When it is impractical or impossible for a L.U. to elect officers with the required standing, the I.P. grants special dispensation."

Elections will be held Friday, June 2, 2023, by mail ballot voting.

No apprentices shall be eligible to hold office in the Local Union.

To be counted, your ballot must be received at the Post Office Box 611780, San Jose, CA 95161, no later than 9:00 am, June 2, 2023.

A run-off election, if required, will be held **June 9, 2023**, by mail ballot voting. To be counted, your ballot must be received at the Post Office Box 611780, San Jose, CA 95161, **no later than 9:00 am, June 30, 2023.**
